Due to the COVID-19 Social Distancing order in place, our office and stations will remain closed to the public until further notice unless you are experiencing an emergency.




BURN AWARENESS WEEK




Burn Awareness Week is February 7-13, 2021!

To make sure you are staying safe around electricity, do the following:

- Plug major appliances directly into a wall outlet
- Never keep batteries in your pocket with coins or other metal objects as they can short circuit and cause burns.
- Always check cords before use for cracks or bare wires.
- Never use indoor extension cords outdoors and never use extension cords for permanent wiring.
- Never plug a generator directly into a household outlet.
- Keep electrical devices and outlets away from water.
- Always use a qualified electrician when performing work on electrical in your home.

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATION ENROLLMENT







The El Dorado County Sheriff's Office-Office of Emergency Services Alert Notification System provides a number of ways in which the county may contact the community in the event of an emergency such as: evacuations due to wildfires or hazardous material spills, or urgent law enforcement operations.

The El Dorado County Office of Emergency
Services partnered with CodeRED emergency
notification service to alert residents and
businesses by telephone, cell phone, text
message, email, and social media when there is
a threat to the health or safety of residents.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is CodeRED and why is it important to me?

CodeRED is an emergency notification service that allows emergency officials to notify residents and businesses by telephone, cell phone, text message, email, and social media regarding time-sensitive general and emergency notifications. Only authorized officials have access to the CodeRED system.

What should I do if I receive a CodeRED message?

Listen carefully to the entire message. You will have the option to repeat the message by pressing any key. Do not call 911 for further information unless directed to do so or if you need immediate aid from the Police or Fire department.

POISON PREVENTION



Prevent poisonings from happening in your home.

Everyday household items such as cleaning products and personal care products can be harmful to kids. Here are a few poison prevention tips to keep little explorers from finding their way into household items that could be dangerous.



- Store household products safely to prevent poisoning. Young kids are often eye-level with items under the kitchen and bathroom sinks, so make sure household cleaning products and personal care products up and away, out of children's reach and sight.
- Keep all household cleaning products in their original containers. Also, when buying products, look for child-resistant containers to help prevent poisoning to children.
- Read and follow product labels. Check for ingredients that can be to kids and make sure you use and store products according to the label. Kids can get into things quickly, so remember not to leave cleaning products or personal care products unattended while you are using them.
- Remember products that might be harmful to kids.
 Check your home for products like cleaning supplies, liquid laundry packets personal care products, plants, pesticides, alcohol and medicine.
- Save the Poison Help number in your phone and post it visibly at home: 1-800-222-1222. Specialists at poison control centers provide free, confidential, expert medical advice 24 hours a day. They can answer questions and help with poison emergencies.

Heart Attack Symptoms

CHEST DISCOMFORT

Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.


DISCOMFORT IN OTHER AREAS OF THE UPPER BODY

Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

- SHORTNESS OF BREATH
 with or without chest discomfort.
- OTHER SIGNS
 may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

HEART HEALTH AWARENESS



Know what to do when you need to perform CPR!

CPR – or Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation – is an emergency lifesaving procedure performed when the heart stops beating. Immediate CPR can double or triple chances of survival after cardiac arrest.



Why Is CPR Important?

Keeping the blood flow active – even partially – extends the opportunity for a successful resuscitation once trained medical staff arrive on site. Chain of Survival CPR is a critical step in the AHA's Chain of Survival. The term Chain of Survival provides a useful metaphor for the elements of the ECC systems concept.


CANDLE SAFETY



Use battery operated candles when possible!

- Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily.
 - Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and batterypowered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.
 - Never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle. Keep matches and lighters up high and out of children's reach, in a locked cabinet.

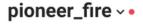

VEGETATION FIRE IN JANUARY

At approximately 11:12 AM on January 19, 2021 Pioneer Fire Protection District, El Dorado County Fire Protection District, Diamond Springs and Cal Fire were dispatched to a vegetation fire on Leoni Rd in Grizzly Flats. Several homes in the immediate area were threaten from the impeding fire that was being driven by moderate winds. Fire Crews were able to gain control of the fire as the winds slowed. No homes were damaged, 5 homes were evacuated but were allowed back in after crews extinguished and overhauled the fire. The fire was completely contained at 3.03 acres.
